As we cannot let this kind of hatred in our hearts, we also cannot let hatred for those who have done this evil deed take root in our hearts and grow. Instead, we seek forums to teach, to listen, and to help people entrenched in this see the Light of Christ. We spend time in prayer for them. Jesus said to "pray for them who persecute you and say all manner of evil against you."

Please churches and pastors in our District and Conference, take time to pray for our nation, for one another, for those filled with hate that they may repent and be renewed in the name of Jesus. I really like Psalm 117, which says, "Praise the Lord, all you nations! Extol him, all you peoples! For great is his steadfast love toward us and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever. My heart grieves! Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball on Charlottesville

My heart grieves! Yesterday, as I was traveling, I was getting bits and pieces of the news from Charlottesville. In the airports, there were some people who were sharing about family and friends who were close to what was happening on the ground in Charlottesville. There were some who didn't know anything about what had happened. But what truly grieved my heart were the people who casually passed off what was happening as just a part of life.

My heart grieves! Just a part of life? Well, it shouldn't be that way! We shouldn't accept this as acceptable, or just the way it is. Violence is not acceptable. Racism is not acceptable.

My heart grieves those who think this is just part of life. My heart grieves those in Charlottesville who got caught in the midst of violence. My heart grieves that racism continues to permeate every part of our nation and our world. My heart grieves situations, family systems, institutional systems where white supremacy promotes and teaches persons that people who are not like them can be treated as less than human, as objects, as life that is dispensable and of lesser value.

This is not life as God intended! God created every person in God's own image. Every person is created with and holds within them a spark of the Divine. God looks at what God creates and proclaims, "This is good!" And, when it comes to the creation of human beings, God doesn't just say this is good – God says, "This is very good!

Every man, woman, and child is created out of and holds within them the spark of the Divine. God sent God's son, Christ, into the world to remind the world of God's blessing and God's love for each person, so that the world might have life and have life abundantly. Today, the Christian Church exists for the purpose of extending this message in all places to all people without restriction.

At the 2017 West Virginia annual Conference session, in a service that celebrated our African American congregations, we acknowledged our brokenness, we asked for forgiveness and participated in an act of repentance and commitment to action. We took one another's hands and borrowing from the words of Hezekiah Walker's song, "I Need You to Survive," we looked into each other's eyes – the eyes of persons who were of a different race or culture, persons with different theological understandings, of different ages and experiences, and we said to one another, "I need you. I will pray for you. I will not harm you with words from my mouth. I need you to survive!" With those commitments ringing in our ears we received communion and pledged, with

resources in hand, to go back to our communities and begin some action, some conversation, some raising awareness that would help us to help each other hear once again that we, and each and every person, are valuable and of sacred worth. One race or person is not supreme over another. We, in fact, need all the variety of persons' gifts in this world not only to survive but experience the abundance of life and blessing that God means for each of God's children.

I pray we will not allow the violence of Charlottesville to be accepted as just the way of life today! This does not fulfill the purpose of creation or the purpose for which God sent God's Son. I pray we will begin needed conversations and relationship building that help us to see people as people, treat people as people – holy, beloved and valuable, and be Christ's people that will stand up and speak out in the midst of the violence of this world. I also pray that we will be the peacemakers that God calls us to be. Jesus said: Blessed are the peacemakers. But maybe all this struggle is because we do not understand what a peacemaker is. What is a peacemaker? It is a person who puts other's needs before their own. Indeed, blessed are the peacemakers.

We are deeply troubled by the hatred and violence thinly cloaked by American rights of free speech and freedom of assembly. We call for an end to this perversion of justice and power that perpetuates terror, racism, and intimidation which is antithetical to the gospel and to the American vision of freedom and justice for all.

Free speech and the ability to protest, while the right of every American, should not be used to terrorize, intimidate, or incite violence. As Christians and United Methodists we believe in the right of all people to thrive as individuals undergirded by a society of laws rooted in our common humanity, our common good, in short - in the love and justice of God.

Dr. King stated, "justice at its best is power correcting everything that stands against love." As monuments to America's sinfully corrupt history of slavery come down across the south, let us not revel in this superficial progress without acknowledging the deep hatred and bigotry rising to resist and defeat the demands of love and justice. Surely the hatred of neo-Nazis, fascists, and white supremacists that we are seeing in Virginia, New Orleans, and cities across this country have no place in this or any other society.

We call on all United Methodists, indeed all people of faith and good conscience, to join in the spirit of our common humanity to be people of power rooted in love and to put that love into action in every community, to stand as allies for justice, neither sentimental nor anemic but resolute in the knowledge that all people are created equal.



Intro to Lay Ministry Basic Course Cindy Boggs, Instructor

This course is for persons discerning a call to proclaim the presence and power of God through Lay Servant Ministries. Basic principles of proclaiming the Word of God through worship leadership, preaching, witnessing, teaching, leadership, and service form the framework for the class. This class will include leading a 5-10 minute devotion during the afternoon. There will be a precourse preparation sheet sent along with the course book when you register.

This course is foundational for all courses in Lay Servant Ministries. Participants are encouraged to discover and employ personal spiritual gifts as God intended and to consider the importance of exercising servant leadership, developing future leaders, remaining rooted in consistent spiritual practices, and being part of a group that holds members accountable in their discipleship.

If you have already completed the basic course, and intend to become a Certified Lay Speaker or Certified Lay Servant, you are invited to sign up for the advanced course listed below:

Lay Servant Advanced Course: "Go Preach!" Alicia Rapking, Instructor

This course is designed with a focus on the principles of preaching, including sermon preparation and scripture study in preparation for preaching. The afternoon session will include preaching by the students and discussion of that experience. You will need to have read the book "Go Preach" prior to the session and complete any provided assignment.

To keep your certificate current an advanced course is needed every three years.

United Methodist Polity (updated using the new 2016 Book of Discipline!)

Ken Krimmel, Instructor

An advanced course in Lay Servant Ministries that gives participants an overview of the structure and organization of The United Methodist Church. The constitution and structural relationships of The United Methodist Church are examined with a particular focus on the workings of the local church. Students are encouraged to bring a 2016 Book of Discipline as reference.

Greetings in the name of Christ! At our Annual Conference session in June, we introduced a theme that will help focus our mission in the West Virginia Conference over the next four years. Our theme is "Cultivating a Culture of Leadership that is Hopeful, Innovative, Invitational, and Generative." In each of the four years we will highlight one aspect of the leadership culture we seek to develop. For the 2017 session of our Conference and for this coming year, our focus targets what it means to be "Hopeful."

During our annual conference session, we celebrated and gave thanks for 2400+ new professions of faith across the conference! The challenge for intentionally reaching more new persons for

Christ was cast last year and this year we celebrate that in the West Virginia Conference we have doubled the number of persons we reach on average within a 12 to 18 month period. This is hopeful and works to motivate clergy and lay leadership to not just introduce people to Christ, but to now lead people into a lifetime of following Christ, helping them to become disciples.

Worship was hope filled. We began the Conference season with a service of water and healing. We remembered the flood waters of 2016, the flood of emotion and loss, and gave thanks for the work of recovery accomplished and the on-going recovery that continues to bring hope to those seeking a better tomorrow and new life. A representative from UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) - one of our recovery partners - was able to join us for this service and we continue to give thanks for the generous connectional giving and help that enables us to bring hope to our hardest hit and most vulnerable communities.

We celebrated our African American congregations and lifted up the hope we have for developing clergy and lay leadership that seeks to build better relationships among persons of clifferent races and cultures within our churches and communities so that we come to truly understand we need each other not only to survive but to thrive. Additionally, we focused on cultivating hopeful leadership as prayed, entered into holy conversation, sang, baptized, ordained, and celebrated the faithful witness and leadership of those who have now entered a new journey called retirement.

Cultivating a culture of hopeful leaders is something upon which The United Methodist Church as a whole is focused as we work to develop principled Christian leaders around the globe.

Enclosed is the 2017-2020 United Methodist Handbook; "Therefore, Go!" This handbook is a resource that is helpful in educating new hope filled disciples and new hopeful leaders to The United Methodist Church. Spiritual Formation Retreat:

"The Role of Small Groups in the Journey of Salvation"

Sponsored by the Spiritual Formation Task Force of the WV Annual Conference

One of the great gifts that John Wesley gave to the Christian Church is the role of small groups in the salvation journey. When we read scriptures such as *Philippians 2:12* where it says, "...Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling...", many times we think of the work of salvation as being strictly an individual work -- such that, by asking Jesus Christ to be the Lord and Guide of one's life, we misguidedly think that it is solely one's own personal responsibility to live that out (i.e., that it is up to me alone to figure out to live into this). Nothing, however, could be further from the truth.

In the early days of Methodism, Mr. Wesley formed Bands, Societies, and Classes to provide mutual support and accountability to people as they grew in their relationship with God. When a person came to be in a relationship with God, they were encouraged to join a small group so that, together with one another, all could grow in their relationships with God and each other. These various kinds of small groups were and are a great gift to Christianity.

The Spiritual Formation Task Force of the WV Annual Conference would like to extend an invitation to come to a retreat at the Pope John XXIII Pastoral Center in Charleston to learn more about the place and work of small groups in one's salvation journey.
